## In Memory of Rev. fim Reese 1934-2019

Christian Horizons is deeply saddened by the loss of our founder, Rev. Jim Reese, on July 5th, 2019. His vision and dedicated work towards a ministry for people with disabilities has changed the lives of people across Canada and around the world. So many of us have been inspired by his legacy.

Jim met the love of his life, Adrienne, in 1952 and they were married five years later. Jim and Adrienne were blessed with five children.

In 1963, Jim and Adrienne gave birth to their son Steven, who was born with developmental disabilities. Two years later, with a group of families, they founded the organization that we know today as Christian Horizons. As Jim Reese explained, the word "horizons" symbolizes the horizontal line where heavenly blessings touch earth's needs.

Driven by the desire to positively impact the lives of children with developmental disabilities and their families, in 1967 the organization hosted the first two-week camp for children with developmental disabilities in the Haliburton Highlands. During the first eight years of Camp Horizon, Jim acted as camp coordinator.



Today, our Family Camp ministry continues as an inspiration of Jim Reese's vision. Every summer in recent years, Jim, Adrienne and Steven could be found at Elim Lodge, near Peterborough, Ontario,

participating in Family Camp along with other families who experience disabilities.

While Camp Horizon continued to expand to meet the growing needs of that ministry, Jim and the leadership had a goal to establish residential homes and opportunities for people with developmental disabilities.

Trusting that God would provide the funds needed, in 1974 Jim and the Board of Directors decided to purchase the first Christian Horizons home in Waterloo for ten adults with developmental disabilities. Its opening in November 1976 marked the beginning of our residential services.

In 1991, Christian Horizons defined our distinct faith-based approach to serving people with disabilities as follows: It is the conviction of Christian Horizons that the pursuit of physical, intellectual, social and spiritual development is best realized with recognition of the guidance of God, as revealed in the Holy Bible and the life of Jesus who said, in Luke 22:26, "let him who is greatest among you become the youngest and him who is the chief and leader as one who serves."





To this day, Christianity has remained at the heart of the ministry birthed in 1965. Christian Horizons was born on the knowledge that God created all people in His image and that all are loved and valued by Him.

As a testament to the life of Jim Reese, today Christian Horizons strives to be an example of God's love for this world. We praise God for Rev. Jim Reese's life of faithful service, for his example and his legacy.

    organization, Christian Horizons serves people who experience disabilities through a
    range of community-based programs including residential, community participation,
    employment and respite programs. Christian Horizons is funded by Ontario's Ministry
    of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS), and Saskatchewan's Ministry of
    Social Services (MSS).
  - Christian Horizons (Canada) Separately incorporated in 1977, Christian Horizons (Canada) includes our domestic work that is not funded directly by the government, including services for purchase and leadership development.
  - Christian Horizons Global Christian Horizons vision of belonging extends to international communities and people at risk around the world through Christian Horizons Global. In partnership with local organizations like churches, schools and disability associations, we help through entrepreneurial education and opportunities, children's services and inclusive education, all aimed towards nurturing communities where people of all abilities can experience belonging. Christian Horizons Global is entirely funded through generous donations from, and partnerships with, individuals, churches, businesses and foundations.
  - Xeorixs Homes A non-profit organization incorporated in 1985, Xeorixs Homes leases homes to Christian Horizons and other developmental services agencies. Xeorixs Homes purchases properties and takes care of property maintenance and upkeep.

We have both learned from and contributed to the conversation of how people with disabilities and their families belong to their neighbourhood.
- 2019 saw the second Canadian Symposium on Theology and Disability a unique event that seeks to engage a wide Christian audience in the theology and disability conversation and practical ministry engagement. The event included participants from denominational leadership and ministers, academics, researchers, self-advocates and family members.
- Christian Horizons continues to be a leader in the North American Faith-Based Roundtable, a
  gathering of Christian agencies that share similar values and mission to support, encourage and
  learn from one another.
- Christian Horizons remains an active member of the Ontario Provincial Network on Developmental Services and active in leadership for the Faith and Culture Inclusion Network.

As Delbert uses a wheelchair, he needs a wheelchair accessible bus to visit friends. He has made friends with the bus driver, who greets him by name each time they meet.

The church Delbert attends is within walking distance of his home. Delbert has become friends with the church organist and pastor. The organist will often play for him as he sings along.

These were four of the people who came to Delbert's personal planning party. Together they talked about how they, as Delbert's new friends, would be there alongside him this coming year.

As Delbert, in his friendly manner, continues to connect with people in his community, we wonder how many new friends he will have by this time next year.





Never Give Up on Your Dreams BY DZIDRA HALAR

My name is Dzidra and I live in Toronto, Ontario. I live in my own apartment with my boyfriend Casey. I work as a cleaning person and help take care of my mom. Casey is currently in project work and helps take care of my mom as well. But it wasn't always this way.

Four years ago, my old roommate invited this cute boy over. When Casey walked through the door I just knew he was mine. It turns out that Casey and I had so much in common. But Casey was supported by another agency and Casey sensed they were not supportive of the relationship. We thought it would be impossible for us to live together.

Our families challenged whether we should be together; some people even said it will never happen. But we kept telling people what we wanted, even when we were discouraged. I wrote a letter to the Christian Horizons executives asking for help. I even called the Ministry, which I think may have caused a little trouble.

The Program Manager where I live said we were groundbreakers, making our own path. She also reminded us we had our rights and our relationship was worth fighting for.

Meetings began to happen between our agencies to try to figure out how Casey and I could live together. They also helped us understand what it would take to help win over Casey's family so that they would support our relationship.

On October 10, 2018, Casey's mom came over with some staff from Casey's agency, and she received an introduction to Christian Horizons and the support Casey could receive. She recognized that our relationship was genuine and agreed to let Casey move to Christian Horizons. On January 21, 2019, Casey moved into my apartment and now it is our home.

We are celebrating our four-year anniversary and are planning to be married. We want people to know that they should never give up on their dreams. What once was called impossible can be a dream come true.



#### **MOVING TO THE CITY**

Michael had been living in Warman, Saskatchewan for three years. As much as Michael enjoyed his time in Warman, his goal was to have his own place in his favourite city, Saskatoon.

In February 2019, Michael's dream became a reality when he moved into a house in Saskatoon with two separate suites – an upstairs suite for Michael and a basement suite for a neighbour.

Michael enjoys his new place and his independence and has recently joined a ball hockey team in the city. He is learning to take city transit and likes being within walking distance to many of his favourite restaurants and malls.

Michael is happy to have a place to call his own and looks forward to what he will accomplish in the future.



#### A GROWING FRIENDSHIP

Larry had the opportunity to move into his new home in Cobourg, Ontario, a newly-built, three-bedroom home where he could live with two friends. When one bedroom remained available after the move, Larry had an idea.

Larry and his good friend Michael, who lived in Port Hope, enjoyed getting together for coffee and connecting. Larry thought that it would be great to invite Michael to move into the available room and Michael readily agreed. Together they worked out the details to move into their new place.

Michael and Larry met with Diane, who works where Larry lives now, and together they outlined all the reasons Michael should move from Port Hope into the home in Cobourg. Michael soon became Larry's new roommate.

Now, Larry and Michael are enjoying lots of coffee together and both men think this is terrific.

The second goal for Helen was that she wanted paid employment, even though she was busy almost every day with her volunteer activities. After an interview at Sarah's Farm Market in Chatham. Ontario, she was offered a job watering flowers.

#### **BELONGING IN THE KITCHEN**

Zac excels at his job. He loves preparing food and is good at it. While preparing lunch for up to 30 patrons, Zac is focused and determined.

"I did it! I have friends and now I am ready to work," said one graduate, Michelle. "I learned employment skills and now I can have a picture on the wall at home for graduation just like my sister."

While looking for employment, Michelle continued to keep up her culinary skills by making meals at home and also serving at her church.

When Michelle interviewed for a position at the local Tim Hortons, she was well prepared. As part of the interview process, Michelle was asked to prepare food at the food prep station. The interviewer was so impressed with her knowledge of safe food handling protocol, her ability to follow all instructions and that she answered all the interview questions with confidence that she was offered a position on the spot.

When he joins his friends on the ball diamond each week, Tyler has a place where he belongs.

# Belonging at the Market

When Kerry is working at the Saskatoon (Saskatchewan) Farmers' Market, she comes to life. Kerry is a quiet, shy person who generally doesn't quickly connect with people when she first meets them. But, all that changes when she's selling wares at the market.

People who use services through Christian Horizons started selling their products at the market early in 2019. They sell items created at the Wood n' Needle store in Waldheim, such as wall hangings and unique blankets and quilts, as well as items produced by Menno Industries, known for its creation of "distressed" furniture.

Kerry greets everyone who comes to the booth and, because she also works at the Wood n' Needle, is able to give a "back story" to every item sold.

Kerry is making herself known at the market.

She has fostered a friendship with some of the food vendors who routinely seek her out to share food samples. And, everyone who works at the stall with Kerry agrees that food samples are very welcome.

#### ENTREPRENEUR GROUP IN SIRE, ETHIOPIA

Christian Horizons helps facilitate entrepreneur groups across Ethiopia. In Sire, 16 parents of sponsored children have joined together to start a laundry business.

Here's how it works:

Each member initially contributes something towards the startup costs. Through generous donor support, the group has been able to purchase a semi-manual clothes washing machine. Since hydro power is not consistent in Sire, the semi-manual feature allows the machine to function even when there is no electricity. So, at a cost of 10 birr per shirt and 15 birr per pair of pants, they are making a good income and providing support to their families.

By supporting Christian Horizons, donors and sponsors have helped projects like this happen. Christian Horizons is active in supporting businesses like this so people can support their families and contribute to their communities.

Maron, the leader of the group, expressed gratitude saying, "Thank you very much. We are very encouraged and we plan to do more in the next coming years."

## INCLUSIVE EDUCATION IN EL MORRO, GUATEMALA-A Place Where Everybody Belongs

Elder, age 10, is learning from his teachers and plays with his friends, smiling along with them as they all learn together.

In the remote mountain village of El Morro, Guatemala, a school has been built on the side of the mountain. Christian Horizons has been supporting the school since 2007 and, as it has grown from two to 10 classrooms, educating all the children in the community. In the center of the school is a building that was renovated for a very important purpose: a resource room for children with learning differences to come for specialized help. Most of the children come for learning sessions and are then integrated into other classes for the majority of the time. For many, the resource room has allowed them to attend school for the first time in their lives.

Elder is one of those children. His grandmother faithfully brings him to school each day. That is not easy in El Morro, as every direction is either steeply uphill or downhill.

Carla, the classroom teacher, is trained as a speech and occupational therapist. With her help, Elder has made great progress, including taking his first steps on his own. Though he requires support to walk, therapy has made it possible for him to move enough to go in and out of his home when he desires. He no longer has to wait for help to move around.

Thanks to sponsorship and inclusive education for making the school in El Morro a place where everybody belongs.

## Christian Horizons Global

Christian Horizons Global continues to walk alongside people with disabilities and whole communities in six countries: Ethiopia, Guatemala, Haiti, Kenya, Nicaragua and Uganda. We focus on inclusive education and sustainable development for families and communities by equipping communities to care for one another and earn a livelihood.

#### **RESPONSIBILITY OF FINANCIAL REPORTING**

**Board of Directors** – The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2019 for Christian Horizons, Christian Horizons (Canada), Christian Horizons Global and Xeorixs Homes have been approved by their respective Board of Directors, which has the overall responsibility for their content.

Management – The financial statements have been prepared by the management team, who are responsible for the integrity, objectivity, and reliability of the information contained therein. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for not-for-profit organizations, and management has made best estimates where deemed appropriate.

Audit Committee – The audit committee oversees management's responsibility for the financial reporting and internal control systems. The committee consists of members of the Board of Directors who are not involved in the daily operations of the organization. The committee meets with management and the external auditors to review the audit findings, satisfy themselves that all audit responsibilities have been properly discharged, and review and recommend approval of the financial statements to the members of Christian Horizons.

**External Auditors** – For the year ended March 31, 2019, KPMG LLP was appointed by the members to audit the organizations' financial statements [Christian Horizons, Christian Horizons (Canada), Christian Horizons Global and Xeorixs Homes]. 
